With the onset of the new century, ACSUS will begin its fourth decade as the nerve center of Canadian studies in the United States. It hardly seems possible that nearly 30 years have passed since a small group of dedicated Canadianists—I think most had Canadian roots—assembled at Duke University to form the Association for Canadian Studies in the United States.

Since that modest beginning, ACSUS has grown in size to be one of the leading professional academic associations in the country. So too, the scope of ACSUS activity has broadened to include professional opportunities not imagined in those early years. Today, ACSUS programs include the Thomas O. Enders Endowment and Fellowship, the ACSUS Distinguished Dissertation Award, the Canadian Studies Publication Grant Award, the ACSUS-in-Canada Colloquium, the Donner Medal in Canadian

Studies, and numerous publications including our respected multidisciplinary journal, *The American Review of Canadian Studies*. Under the superb directorship of David Biette, ACSUS provides critical support and resources for increasing numbers of Canadianists in the U.S., Canada, and many other countries.

The recent biennial conference in Pittsburgh was a major success. Drawing over 525 Canadianists from all over the world, ACSUS '99 in Pittsburgh was one of the largest and most successful ever. More than 100 panels highlighted research in virtually all academic disciplines in the social sciences and humanities. Conferees heard outstanding presentations from Michael Enright, Charles Taylor, the Hon. Louise Beaudoin, the Hon. Pierre Pettigrew, and the Hon. James Blanchard. Following tradition, a wonderful writers salon brought together authors Gail Scott, Shani

UNH Launches Canadian Studies Program

The University of New Hampshire will offer an undergraduate minor in Canadian studies beginning Fall 2000. The minor will be administered at the Center for International Education and is the first step in creating a larger program in Canadian studies at UNH.

Thanks to a Program Enhancement Grant from the Canadian Embassy, this developmental year will augment the Canadian content of existing courses by way of field trips and invited speakers, expand the library's Canadian collection, run a workshop to develop an interdisciplinary Introduction to Canadian Studies course, and provide faculty development opportunities for UNH faculty to expand or develop new areas of expertise in Canadian studies. Recently, the *Canadian Journal of Regional Science* carried articles on education and employment, the end of distance and dispersion of economic activity, a comparison of labor underpayment in Canada and the U.S., income convergence across Canadian provinces, the role of resources in local development, and property taxation, as well as special issues focused on North American trade and investment and on the metropolis.

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ICCS Canadian Studies Academic Internship Program

The International Council for Canadian Studies is pleased to announce the recipients of the Canadian Studies Academic Internship Program for 2000. The Program enables young Canadian and foreign academics who have completed a doctoral thesis on a topic primarily related to Canada to visit a Canadian or foreign university with a Canadian studies program for a teaching or research internship (assistantship). The award provides return economy airfare and c\$2,500 per month for a maximum of three months.

ACSUS member Edmund Q.S. (Ned) Searles has received one of this year's awards and will spend a two-month academic internship at the Université Laval. Searles will work under the supervision of Professor Louis-Jacques Dorais of the Department of Anthropology and will include an investigation of the experiences of Inuit living in Montreal, Ottawa, and Quebec City. During this research internship, he will conduct participant observation and a series of semi-structured interviews with Inuit (including those born in Nunavut, Arctic Quebec, Inuvialuit, and Labrador) living in these cities, and to examine how their urban experiences are both consistent with or contradictory to ideas about what it means to be Inuit today. This project is an extension of his doctoral dissertation that explores the production of Inuit cultural identity in Nunavut. By extending the study of Inuit identity to Inuit living in some of Canada's larger cities, he hopes to increase understanding of how aboriginal peoples in Canada's urban spaces forge links between place and identity in the experience and practice of "being Aboriginal."

ICCS Graduate Student Thesis/Dissertation Scholarship: Recipients for 2000

ICCS Graduate Student Thesis/Dissertation Scholarship, funded through the Canadian Studies Endowment Fund of the International Council for Canadian Studies, is intended to facilitate and renew the community of Canadianists by supporting the work of young scholars. It enables successful candidates to spend 4-6 weeks at a Canadian university or

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research site other than their own doing research related to their thesis or dissertation in the field of Canadian studies. The ICCS has awarded ICCS Graduate Student Thesis/Dissertation Scholarships annually since 1996.

ACSUS member Jennifer Gauthier is one of twelve graduate students to receive an award this year. She will conduct research at the University of Ottawa for her dissertation on "Canadian Film, Cultural Policy, and National Identity." The grant will allow her to conduct dissertation research in Canada under the direction of Denis Bachand at the University of Ottawa, which has also awarded her an add-on grant for the project. Gauthier will spend four months this fall doing field research in federal and provincial archives in Ontario and Quebec to examine cultural policy documents, specifically those that relate to the feature film industry. Her dissertation examines the discourses of Canadian national identity as constructed by federal and provincial film policy and feature films. It also seeks to address the various institutional constraints that affect the conceptions of national identity in Canada. Gauthier has also received a graduate student fellowship from the Canadian Embassy for this project.

James J. Hill Library

The James J. Hill Library will award a number of grants of up to \$2,000 to support research in the James J. Hill, Louis W. Hill, and Reed/Hyde papers.

The James J. Hill Papers (1856-1916) are an extensive and rich source for studies of transportation politics, finance, native American relations, art collecting, philanthropy, urbanization, immigration, and economic development in the Upper Midwest, Pacific Northwest, and Western Canada.

The Louis W. Hill Papers (1886-1948) document similar subjects, as well as his involvement in the development of Minnesota's iron mining industry and the development of Glacier National Park and the related tourist industry. Additionally, they detail social and cultural activities from the Gilded Age through World War II.

The Reed/Hyde Papers (1853-1960) document the business activities, family, and social lives of four generations, beginning with Samuel Reed, a civil engineer who was best known for his work during construction of the Union Pacific Railroad in the 1860s. Subsequent activities included farming, flour milling, and mining, as well as important service in the Red Cross in Europe during World War I.

1999 Executive Council Meeting

At its meeting in November 1999 held in conjunction with the biennial conference in Pittsburgh, in addition to approving routine matters, the ACSUS Executive Council voted to:

- add one more step to the income-based dues structure, beginning with dues for 2001, so that individuals with an income of less than \$30,000 per year would be charged dues of \$40 per year

- eliminate the category of "retired member" beginning with dues for 2001, since the dues structure is income-based
- clarify the guidelines for the Thomas O. Enders Endowment's fellowship criteria to read: "The selection committee should in its deliberations give weight to a candidate who is an active, dynamic participant in the intellectual life of the academic community and whose proposal is innovative in its approach to advancing the Canadian-U.S. relationship, *and who has not had the opportunity to be affiliated with a Canadian university during the previous 12 months.*"
- clarify the application procedures for the Enders Fellowship so that in addition to the letter and other materials indicating reasons

for seeking the fellowship, candidates must also list their reasons for desiring residence at the host university

- hold the 2003 biennial conference in Portland, Oregon
- endorse the 1940 Statement of Principles on Academic Freedom and Tenure as submitted by the American Association of University Professors

The Council also agreed to ask disciplinary section chairs for the biennial conference to continue as the principal contact for disciplines for the year following the conference.

Donner Medal Awarded to Bob Monahan

From Bob Monahan's remarks on accepting the Donner Medal:

I am greatly honored to be given the Donner medal. I stand in awe and admiration of previous recipients Bill Metcalfe, Richard Beach, Marion Salinger, the late Jeanne Kissner, Charles Doran, Norm London, and Alice Stewart among others, and applaud their important and varied contributions.

Why study Canada—indeed! It has been—and is a joy and a pleasure—to study and work for the understanding of a nation which struggles for world peace and for the well-being of all their people. Here is a nation which has beat some of its swords into plowshares for peace. Canada converted Canadian Forces Base in Cornwallis, Nova Scotia, into an instrument for world peace. It created the Lester B. Pearson International Peacekeeping Centre to educate and train peacekeepers for the world, a little known and appreciated role for this great nation. Here is a country which assumed leadership in banning land mines throughout the world. Some fifty nations have signed on to stop the disproportionate killing of civilian children and women. Canada also cares about Canadians, providing health care for all and making strong efforts to minimize grinding poverty.

I am proud to have been a part of a group which fosters the study of Canada, this nation which offers much to the world in promoting peace and in improving social well-being.

Children have a way of keeping things in perspective. We told our daughters that I was getting the Donner Medal. They are tried and true Westerners, schooled in the history of European settlement of the West including the surmounting of the high Sierras. One quipped, "Gee, Dad, are you getting a medal for chewing up your colleagues?"

I now want to thank three people out of the many to whom I owe a great debt of gratitude for bringing me this award. First, my long time colleague, Don Alper, who worked very closely with me in building Canadian studies at home and elsewhere. For over fifteen years he contributed and contributed without release time or compensation. A second person is Marion Salinger who, beginning with the 1975 Duke Summer School at Royal Military College, provided counsel and guidance on things Canadian. Last, but by no means least, is my wife of forty-nine years, Marilyn, who provides inspiration, overlooks my shortcomings, and without complaint let me devote inordinate amounts of time to mistress Canada.

I thank them and I thank all of you for the honor given to me this day.

John Lennox Wins Governor General's International Award

The International Council for Canadian Studies is pleased to announce that **John Lennox** of York University is the winner of the Governor General's International Award for Canadian Studies for 2000. The award will be presented at a ceremony in Ottawa May 19, 2000.

A professor of English in the Faculties of Arts and Graduate Studies at York University, Lennox is well known for his research and teaching in the areas of Canadian life-writing, fiction, and literary history. He earned the degrees of B.A. from York University, M.ès.A. from Université de

Sherbrooke, and Ph.D. from the University of New Brunswick.

He is co-author, with Clara Thomas, of *William Arthur Deacon: A Canadian Literary Life* (1982), and co-editor, with Michele Lacombe, of *Dear Bill: The Correspondence of William Arthur Deacon* (1988). He also has edited *Margaret Laurence - Al Purdy: A Friendship in Letters* (1993) and, with Ruth Panofsky, *Selected Letters of Margaret Laurence and Adele Wiseman* (1997). Lennox is the author of numerous scholarly articles and reviews and has also contributed entries in national and international reference works on Canadian literature and Canadian biography.

Lennox has been President of the Association for Canadian and Québec Literatures, the Association for Canadian Studies, and the International Council for Canadian Studies. At York, he has served as Director of the Graduate Programme in English, and was the founding Director of the Robarts Centre for Canadian Studies. He is currently Acting Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies.

In Memory of Alice R. Stewart, 1915-2000

Members of the Canadian studies community will be saddened to learn of the death of Alice R. Stewart, Emerita Professor of History, co-founder of the Canadian-American Center, distinguished alumna of the University of Maine, and one of the founders of ACSUS. Alice passed away on January 7, leaving behind a considerable legacy at the University and in Canadian studies, as well as an extensive network of friends, former students, and academic colleagues in Maine, the United States, and Canada.

Alice was the only child of Fred T. and Elna Stewart of Jonesport and Brunswick, Maine. She attended public schools in Brunswick, and then moved on to the University of Maine, her father's alma mater. Graduating in 1937 with an A.B. degree *summa cum laude* in history, Alice went on to do graduate studies at Radcliffe College (Harvard), receiving a master's degree in 1938 and a doctorate in 1946. Her main research interest was on the 19th

century imperial policies of Sir John A. MacDonald, Canada's first prime minister. She joined the History faculty at Maine in 1947, where she served with distinction until 1980.

During her long academic career, Alice Stewart was a prime mover in establishing the interdisciplinary program in Canadian studies at the University of Maine, now one of the leading programs of its kind in the country. She developed the graduate program in Canadian History, joined with Professor Edgar Mackay in founding the Canadian-American Center in 1967, and built up the world-class collection of Canadiana in Fogler Library. Although she published scholarly articles and book reviews in a number of Canadian and American journals, her main academic interest was in bibliography; the strength of the library's Canadian collection reflects that expertise and knowledge. Alice was an inveterate traveler to Canadian studies and Canadian History conferences, making friendships with many academics on both sides of the border. She was particularly interested in Canada's Maritime

Provinces, and was well known in the region.

As one of the pioneers in the study of Canada in the U.S., Alice Stewart received notable recognition. She was awarded the Donner Medal in 1979, and received honorary degrees from the University of New Brunswick and St. Mary's University.

On meeting Alice Stewart for the first time, her towering height and formal bearing presented a forbidding appearance. Yet she was a person much concerned with the well-being of others. An excellent advisor to graduate students and a mentor to young faculty, Alice had time for all she met and kept in touch with many of her former students. The great affection that her students, colleagues, and friends had for her is revealed in the many appreciative messages received at the Canadian-American Center since her death.
